Essentials of False Alarm Reduction Course

The Essentials of False Alarm Reduction course was presented October 26, 2010 in Ann Arundel County, Maryland at the request of Mid-Atlantic FARA Chapter members. This class was developed by FARA International, and the training day was sponsored the Maryland Burglar and Fire Alarm Association. There were 20 participants from public safety and the alarm industry from Maryland and Virginia. Several jurisdictions that are at the beginning phase of either implementing a false alarm program and/or are preparing a false alarm ordinance were in attendance. The class, originally developed as a two-day course, has been condensed into one day, because FARA is sensitive to how valuable time is for our members. No content was lost through this consolidation, and the course



is still robust with time for interactive exercises, networking and Q&A.



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Many thanks go out to FARA Instructors, Bill Douglas from the Loudoun County Sheriff's Office in Virginia; Stuart Forchheimer (pictured at left), President of Homesafe Security Systems, Inc. in Baltimore, Maryland; and Norma Beaubien, Montgomery County Police Department in Maryland, for taking time out of their busy schedules to present this course. Having instructors from a sheriff's office, police department and alarm company provided a great opportunity to hear varying sides of the same coin and was very beneficial. If you want to hold an Essentials of False Alarm Reduction class in your area, be prepared to receive lots of helpful information, presented by experts in the field, to assist you in developing and managing your false alarm reduction program. Everything you need to develop or improve your program is addressed in this class. Hand outs are excellent and include such topics as forming a false alarm work group when developing an ordinance, creating a Web site, unit expenses, tracking and billing, false alarm causes and prevention and much, much more.

Level 1 Alarm Class

A group of public safety Mid-Atlantic Chapter members participated in the Maryland Level 1 Burglar & Limited Fire Alarm Course. This course was graciously offered by the Maryland Burglar and Fire Alarm Association (MDBFAA) on a complimentary basis to public safety FARA members. While definitely geared toward alarm system installers, this course provided in-depth training that allows public safety members to better understand how alarm system operate, which better prepares them to answer questions, troubleshoot false alarm problems and do their jobs more efficiently and effectively. Topics included, but were not limited to: law, standards and codes, professionalism and ethics, general electricity and electronics, system installation, reducing false alarms and troubleshooting. A test was administered on the second day and those who passed were certified as a Level 1 Burglar & Limited Fire Alarm Technicians. Many thanks go out to the MDBFAA for putting this class on for public safety.

Chapter Meeting

The Mid-Atlantic Chapter of FARA International also held its third meeting of 2010 on September 22. Mid-Atlantic Associate Director Ken Roussey of Vintage Security in Jessup, Maryland hosted the meeting. After a very short structured meeting, the highlight of the morning was the question and answer session with industry leaders. Approximately 35 members and guests had an opportunity to participate in an open forum discussion. Public safety members asked questions of Vintage Security representatives and learned from them, as well as from other alarm companies who attended the meeting. Questions included how to deal with senior citizens, putting systems on test, bypassing faulty zones, third-party monitoring and updating customer information, issues with the hearing impaired, enhanced call verification, 1+ duress alarms, realtor situations and more. NESA Held Annual Meeting In Galveston, TX

On October 21 the NESA board of directors met as a part of the TBFAA Annual Meeting. During the meeting the board elected the following officers, who will take office on January 1, 2011. Jordon Brown of Arkansas will be the new President and Chris Russell will be the new Vice President and continue as the Texas Burglar & Fire Alarm Assn. Director. Dean Coburn of ADI was re-elected as Associate Director and current President Rex Adams will serve as Past President. The remaining officers will continue to serve until the 2011 annual meeting.

The board also:

- approved revisions to the FARA-NESA Alarm Equipment Guide
- decided to hold its annual meeting for 2011 at the FARA International Annual Training Symposium on April 5th in San Antonio, TX.
- discussed industry standards
- planned improvements to the NESA Monitor
- discussed expanding communications including using social media
- approved a \$5,000 contribution to the FARA Institute to provide reimbursements for public safety to attend the FARA Symposiums. The board decided that the contribution can only be used for public safety professionals in NESA member states, unless the state association in a non-member state agrees to send an officer to the Symposium
- Added \$2,000 to the budget to fund officer travel to represent NESA at FARA and other meetings

IQ Certification Program: The Answer to Poor Workmanship and Trunk Slammers?

Poor workmanship and trunk slammers...have been a black mark on our industry. However, it should be obvious that the size of a company is not necessarily a guarantee of quality. There are many small, one-man operations that do professional quality work and many large organizations that leave much to be desired. The same is true in reverse. So how can consumers know which companies to trust? How can Public Safety Officials know which companies are meeting the highest standards and doing all they can to reduce false dispatches?

Fortunately, the industry has the Installation Quality (IQ) Certification Program. Our goal is to continue to work together with FARA and reduce false dispatches. That's why it's important that FARA members know and understand the IQ program.

- **Best Practices** IQ has established a set of best practices and de facto consensus standards on installation quality as well as a checklist to ensure that the customer knows how to operate their alarm system. Both small and large alarm companies who are IQ Certified follow these guidelines. IQ companies are using their certification to form better relationships with law enforcement and fire prevention professionals.
- **Training** IQ does not offer training, but training is a requirement for certification. All technicians must have training from National Training School (NTS), CANASA or an approved equivalent. Training is also required for customers, which is also a help in reducing false dispatches. Beyond training, standards are followed on system design, product selection, installation, customer training and monitoring.
- Certification The certification process involves the company ownership making a dedicated commitment to the IQ program, appointment of a company IQ compliance officer, submission of an application, review of the company's application by the IQ Board, which obtains information on the company from the local police, fire and state regulatory agencies regarding the applicant company performance, history and license status.
- **Ethics** While the IQ Certification Program cannot address management styles or techniques, it does have a Code of Ethics within the IQ Guidelines. If you are aware of any violation of these by an IQ Certified company, please advise the IQ Certification Board of Directors so that an inquiry can be started.

- **Substandard Installations** The same holds true for substandard installations by IQ. IQ does not inspect the work, but the IQ Board takes these issues very seriously and will investigate any IQ Certified company regarding compliance with the IQ Guidelines and Policies. The IQ Board does not rubber stamp all applicants. Recently the IQ Certification Board denied certification to both companies that applied as new and for renewal of IQ Certification. IQ is not just another plaque to hang on the wall. It must be earned initially and continually. I would ask FARA members to supply the IQ Certification Board with photos if they are aware of any substandard work done by IQ companies.
- **Industry Recognition** The IQ Certification program has been recognized by leading associations (including FARA) for its value in helping decrease the occurrence of false dispatches. The Electronic Security Association (ESA formerly NBFAA), Central Station Alarm Association, SIAC, CANASA and SIA have all endorsed the IQ Certification Program.
- **Recommendations** IQ Certification also serves as a way for you to distinguish those companies that have implemented proactive steps to reduce false dispatches through quality system installations and end user education. By knowing which companies are working to reduce false dispatches, IQ Certification provides you with a legal and ethical way to recommend quality companies to consumers.

Both FARA an IQ have made considerable progress in the past years. The IQ Board of Directors appreciates the support FARA has shown to IQ. Let's continue to work together to promote quality and ease the burden that false alarms place on the public safety community.
